**2022 General Election**

**December 2021**

Survey conducted December 5 through December 6, 2021. 914 likely 2022 General Election voters participated in the survey. Survey weighted to match expected turnout demographics for the 2022 General Election. Margin of Error is +/-3.1% with a 95% level of confidence. Totals do not always equal 100% due to rounding.



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**Q1: Generally speaking, is New York City headed in the right direction or is it going off on the wrong track?**

Right direction: 32%

Wrong track: 51%

Not sure: 17%

**Q2: Do you approve or disapprove of the job Bill de Blasio has done as Mayor of New York City?**

Strongly approve: 20%

Somewhat approve: 23%

**TOTAL APPROVE: 43%**

Somewhat disapprove: 9%

Strongly disapprove: 42%

**TOTAL DISAPPROVE: 51%**

Not sure: 6%

**Q3: New York City will soon have a new Mayor. Are you optimistic or pessimistic that incoming Mayor Eric Adams will improve the city?**

Very optimistic: 30%

Somewhat optimistic: 33%

**TOTAL OPTIMISTIC: 63%**

Somewhat pessimistic: 15%

Very pessimistic: 11%

**TOTAL PESSIMISTIC: 26%**

Not sure: 11%



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**Q4: The City Council is considering allowing non-US-citizens to vote in New York City elections. Do you support or oppose allowing non-citizens to vote in New York City?**

Strongly support: 18%  
Somewhat support: 15%  
**TOTAL SUPPORT: 33%**  
Somewhat oppose: 9%  
Strongly oppose: 52%  
**TOTAL OPPOSE: 61%**  
Not sure: 6%

**Q5: Proponents of non-citizen voting point out that non-citizens pay taxes and use city services and deserve representation. Does this make you more or less likely to support allowing non-citizens to vote?**

More likely: 31%  
Less likely: 31%  
No difference: 38%

**Q6: Opponents of non-citizen voting say that giving non-citizens the vote undermines citizenship, removing one of the main incentives for immigrants to become US citizens. Does this make you more or less likely to support allowing non-citizens to vote?**

More likely: 28%  
Less likely: 46%  
No difference: 26%

**Q7: Proponents of non-citizen voting say that only non-citizens holding Green Cards and other non-US-citizens with work permits would be able to vote. Does this make you more or less likely to support allowing non-citizens to vote?**

More likely: 32%  
Less likely: 39%  
No difference: 29%



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**Q8: Opponents of non-citizen voting say that at a time when foreign interference in US elections is a concern, this change would mean nearly 30 percent of the city's voters could be made up of newly eligible non-US-citizens. Does this make you more or less likely to support allowing non-citizens to vote?**

More likely: 20%  
Less likely: 58%  
No difference: 22%

**Q9: The City Council is considering allowing non-US-citizens to vote in New York City elections. Do you support or oppose allowing non-citizens to vote in New York City?**

Strongly support: 22%  
Somewhat support: 14%  
TOTAL SUPPORT: 36%  
Somewhat oppose: 11%  
Strongly oppose: 50%  
TOTAL OPPOSE: 61%  
Not sure: 3%

**Q10: Should the New York City Council place the measure to allow non-US citizen voting on the ballot for all the city's voters to decide rather than having just the Council deciding?**

Yes: 61%  
No: 19%  
Not sure: 20%
