Survey conducted April 2 through April 5, 2022. 1,244 likely 2022 General Election voters participated in the survey. Survey weighted to match expected turnout demographics for the 2022 General Election.

Margin of Error is +/-2.8% with a 95% level of confidence. Totals do not always equal 100% due to rounding.
