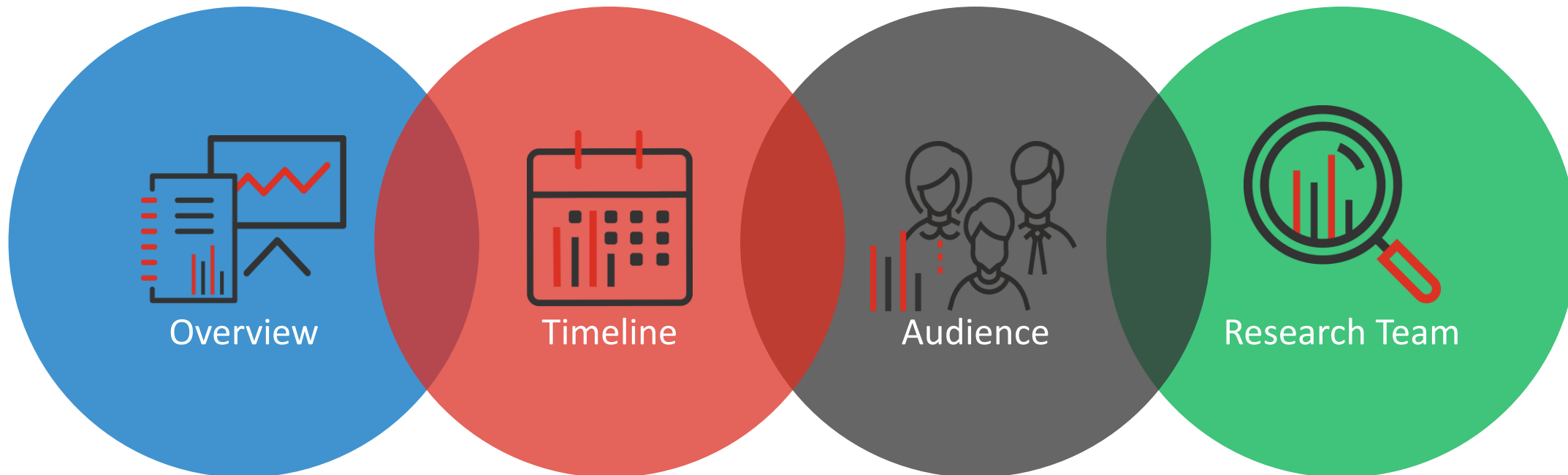

Missouri Statewide Mixed-Mode Survey

Methodology



- Public Opinion Strategies conducted a mixed-mode statewide survey in Missouri.
- Mixed-Mode breakdown:
 - Phone 60% (N=360)
 - Text-To-Web 40% (N=240)
- The survey was conducted September 4-9, 2024
- The survey was conducted among N=600 registered voters.
- The margin of error for a survey of N=600 is 4.0%.
- Bill McInturff and Jim Hobart were the principal researchers on this project. Hannah Stover was the project director and David Yedlin provided analytical support.

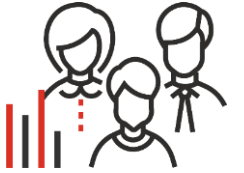

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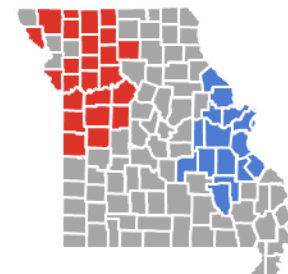

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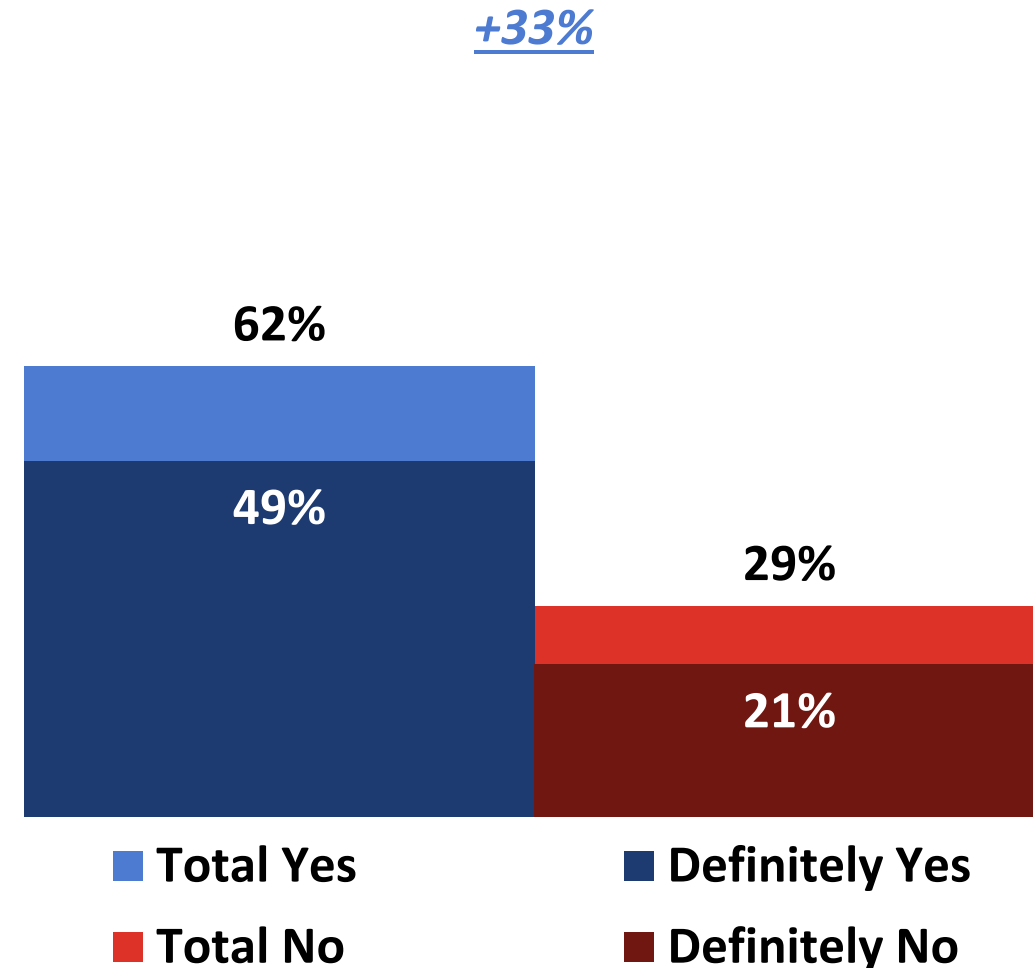

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A clear majority of Missouri voters support the ballot measure. Intensity of support is especially strong.

The following is a ballot measure that voters in Missouri will be asked to vote on in the upcoming November election.

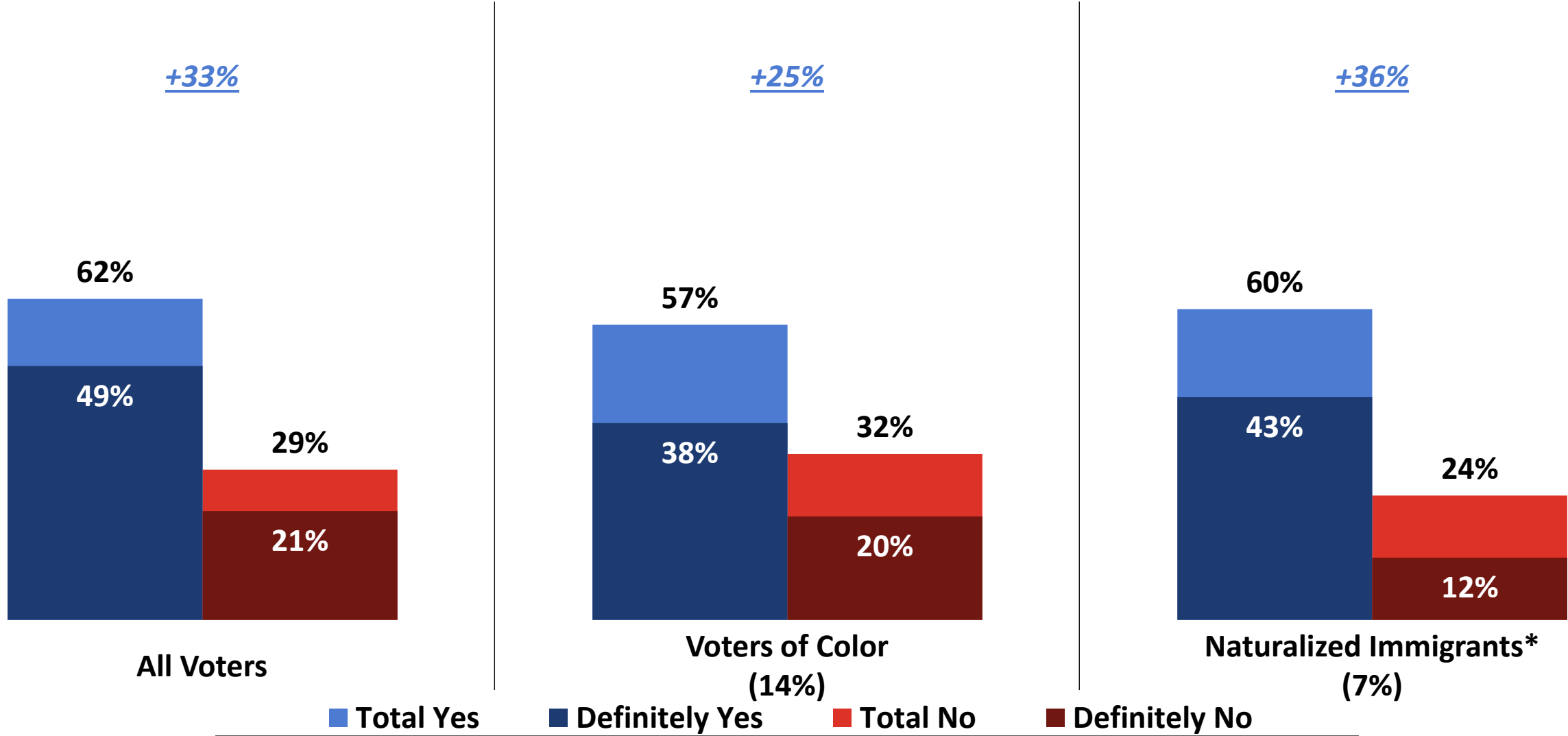
The measure reads:

Shall the Missouri Constitution be amended to; Make the Constitution consistent with state law by only allowing citizens of the United States to vote; Prohibit the ranking of candidates by limiting voters to a single vote per candidate or issue; and Require the plurality winner of a political party primary to be the single candidate at a general election.



Now, if the election were being held today, would you vote Yes to approve or No to reject this ballot measure?

Now, if the election were being held today, would you vote Yes to approve or No to reject this ballot measure?

The part of the ballot measure focused on allowing only U.S. citizens to vote is the most popular, but sizable majorities support all three components.

<i>Prohibit the ranking of candidates by limiting voters to a single vote per candidate or issue.</i>	69%	31%
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<i>Require the plurality winner of a political party primary to be the single candidate in the general election.</i>	67%	32%
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Even a majority of Democrats support allowing only U.S. citizens to vote.
